Rector's Rambling

Today is the 11th Day of Christmas and Tuesday we begin a new Church season with the Feast of

the Epiphany. This feast day has two names, but both mean the same thing. To have an "epiphany" is to have something made manifest, or to have something shown to you. In the 1928 Book of Common Prayer the title for Tuesday's feast is *The Epiphany, or the Manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles*.

In the Christmas story we hear that the shepherds in the fields heard, by the proclamation of the Angelic Hosts, the good news of Jesus' birth. The shepherds represent the people of the Jews, since there would have surely been Jews in that region. They come and adore Jesus.

The Magi (Wise Men or Three Kings) are *not* Jews, but Gentiles. We hear in scripture that these wise men came from the east, having seen in the stars an amazing, celestial event which they understood to be the portent of the birth of a new king.

So, they went to Herod, assuming that this would foretell the birth of his heir, but

of course there was no baby there. Herod, whom secular history confirms was a man of great jealousy and wrath, tries to convince these men to let him know when and where they have found this king ("...bring me word again, that I may come and worship him"). Obviously, Herod had a poisonous intent; not to worship but destroy him. However, the Magi were warned of God in a dream and Herod's plan was thwarted.

As the shepherds represented the people of the Jews coming to worship Jesus, since it is the fulfillment of the promise to them to send a Saviour, so the Magi represent the rest of us. Gentile basically means, "not Jew".

Jesus' birth is Good News, not only to the Jew, but the Gentile as well. He is Lord of all, and all are included in the New Covenant sealed in His blood on the cross. He was made manifest to the Jews in the persons of the shepherds, and to the rest of us through these wise men who also came to worship.

And the wise *still* come and worship Him!

give it to an usher.

Communion Procedure

The Episcopal House of Bishops, in a 1979 teaching, lays out the following guideline for non-Episcopalians to receive communion in an Episcopal Church: The persons should 1) have been Baptized with water in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, 2) believe Christ is present in the sacrament, 3) have been admitted to Holy Communion in their own denomination, and 4) are attempting, by God's grace, to live in love and charity with their neighbor. If you have any questions, please speak to the priest.

To receive the Host, raise your crossed hands, right palm over left. You may also receive directly on the tongue. If you do not wish to receive the Cup, cross your arms over your chest and wait for the chalice bearer to

pass by.

If you are not receiving communion, you still may come forward to the rail, cross your arms over your chest,

and receive a blessing.

If you are physically unable to approach the rail, please inform an usher and the Sacrament will be brought to you.

Pastoral Care

Please inform the clergy if you or a family member are ill, hospitalized, or unable to attend the regular worship of the Church so that a pastoral visit can be arranged. Please contact the clergy to discuss arrangements for baptisms, weddings, or burials **before** any announcement or other plans are made.

Outreach

Food may be deposited in the basket at the entrance of the church to aid the neighborhood ministry to the poor through Crossroads and Georgia Street Community Co-on.

Dedicated donations for the support of the *Malawi Education Fund* and *Rector's Discretionary Fund* can be put in the collection plate with a note in the memo

line or on the envelope.

Collections of school supplies, cleaning supplies, garden tools, Christmas presents, mittens, sweaters, etc. occur throughout the year to support our community.


